## All change in parks

## Storm damage

Severe storms in the south east of England on Sunday 27 October caused approximately £30,000 worth of damage to trees in our parks and open spaces.

As well as those that blew over, many trees were damaged and needed work to make them safe. The final clear up took several weeks due to the wet ground making many areas inaccessible. Some parks were unscathed while others suffered damage to numerous trees; in particular Aberford Park (pictured), Leeming Park and Ripon Park in Borehamwood and King George Recreation Ground in Bushey all suffered significant damage.

We have experienced several smaller storms over the last three months and surprisingly the damage from these has been minor in comparison.

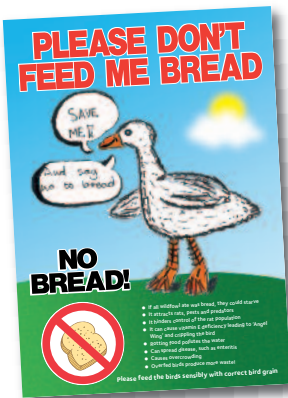
Some replacement planting will be carried out in the autumn.



# Bad bread

The Friends of Four Parks Association have been working hard to educate the public to feed wild bird food to the ducks at Aberford Park rather than bread.

Bread can have a detrimental effect on the birds. It has poor nutritional value and can cause angel wing and other growth defects. It can spread disease and cause a build-up of waste in the water system.



Efforts to educate park visitors about the negative effects have previously been limited to written notices displayed on boards in the parks, so the Friends have taken a more proactive approach.

Local primary schoolchildren were invited to enter a competition to design a poster encouraging people to use wild bird food instead of bread. The winning entry was by Matthew Read of Woodlands Primary School and his posters can now be seen at four locations around the lake.

Duck food is available from the following locations for £1 a box:

- Aberford café in the park.
- Images Hairdressers, Croxdale Road.
- Elstree and Borehamwood Town Council, Fairway Avenue.



# Piranha like fish found in Borehamwood lake!

In February a dead fish was found floating in the lake in Aberford Park, Borehamwood.

After a bit of research it was identified as a Silver Arowana, a carnivorous fish whose usual habitat is the Amazon river basin in South America!

It's possible that an aquarium enthusiast found the feisty fish too much to handle as they can often jump and need a strong and efficient filtration system along with a good sized tank – in the wild they can reach four feet!



The fish was reported to the Environment Agency, who monitor non-native fish as they can pose a threat to the ecology in the water system by depleting existing fish stocks, interrupting the food cycle or spreading disease.

# Oakmere Park bandstand

We are currently looking at ideas for a bandstand in Oakmere Park, Potters Bar. Once installed it will be able to host a variety of events, including local bands and Christmas carol concerts. Further information will be provided in the park and on our website as the project develops.

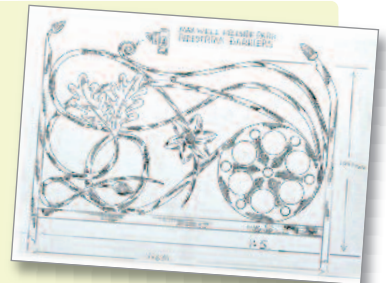


## New path at Maxwell Hillside

## New guide for exploring the Wall Hall Estate

This winter CMS launched a new leaflet and interpretation boards for the Wall Hall estate in Aldenham.

The leaflet provides a guide and map for three circular routes, so you can explore the countryside surrounding Wall Hall on foot, bicycle or horseback. The CMS volunteers have installed interpretation boards along the routes to provide information and draw attention to points of interest along the way.

Wall Hall is part of Hertfordshire County Council's Rural Estate and they have dedicated an additional 1.5 miles of new paths and upgraded a further 1.5 miles from footpath to bridleway, making them accessible to horse riders and cyclists. Many of these paths have been surfaced, making them suitable in all weathers.

The project is a partnership between Hertfordshire County Council and Hertsmere Borough Council and has involved local interest groups such as the Open Spaces Society, local conservation and footpath societies, bridleways trusts and cycling groups.

Councillor Harvey Cohen, Portfolio Holder for Planning and Localism at Hertsmere Borough Council, said: "It's wonderful to see the new routes completed as part of Hertsmere's original Greenways Strategy and I hope local people take advantage of them and explore the great outdoors. This is a prime example of what can be achieved on a previously developed green belt site."



The funding for the project came through a section 106 obligation relating to a development of new housing at Wall Hall.

## New plan for Studio Way woodland trail

The new management plan for Studio Way woodland trail, Borehamwood is almost finalised.

The plan will continue previous work, including the removal of mature Poplar trees on the site and management of existing and recently planted woodland. There is also a focus on making the trail more attractive to visitors by improving the entrances, clearing rubbish and old fencing and installing new noticeboards and information about the wildlife and history of the area.

## Composers Park in harmony

The Heritage Lottery funded project at Composers Park in Elstree has been progressing well over the winter.

Works have included restoration of old hedgerows, removal of scrub from the meadows to enable wildflowers to thrive and thinning of plantations to enable the remaining trees to develop into strong specimens.

A new eye-catching entrance feature to the park on Watford Road (A411) has been commissioned to provide a focus for visitors and encourage them to explore the park. Artist blacksmith, Nigel Barnett of Fransham Forge, is creating the feature, with the design incorporating images of wildlife that can be found at the park.

In the spring a new wildlife pond will be constructed to create new habitats for amphibians, such as frogs, and new interpretive materials, currently being designed will be completed by the start of summer.

## Watling Chase Community Forest

Many of these projects are being supported by the Watling Chase Community Forest (WCCF) Small Projects Fund administered by CMS.

The fund is a valuable means of stimulating small-scale projects and is awarded to schemes that involve the local community, improve the natural environment and promote enjoyment of the WCCF area.

Projects need to be of public benefit, appropriate to the ecology, landscape and archaeology of the area and can be up to 50% of the agreed costs, to a maximum of £2,000. To view the area covered by WCCF and apply for funding, see the WCCF pages at: <http://ow.ly/p2VE2>

## Parkfields Stream restoration

In Borehamwood, the plan to restore the stream through Parkfields is moving forward.

Proposals include the creation of a new channel with a natural sinuous course, gently sloping sides and a shallow 'shelf' where wetland plants can thrive. The old, straight and steep-sided concrete channel will be broken up and filled in. Some scrub will also be cut back along the nearby bank so that any excess soil from the excavation can be spread.

The new stream banks will be seeded by cutting 'green hay' from the adjacent wildflower grassland. This hay will be cut just before the grass and flowers drop their seeds to be spread on the new banks to germinate in the bare soil. The new shelf on the stream bed will be planted up with wetland plants such as iris, sedges and purple loosestrife.

The project is a partnership between Hertsmere Borough Council, the Environment Agency and CMS, who are providing advice on the selection of plant species and the restoration and aftercare of the vegetation.

## Horses and hurdles

Over winter, the coppice management of the Furzefield Wood Local Nature Reserve in Potters Bar has seen a new addition to the work force in the form of Roy, a Suffolk Punch horse.

Roy has been brought in to help extract timber and coppice products (made from the cut trees) from the wood to the roadside.

Local people had an opportunity to meet Roy and watch him working in December last year when the CMS hosted an open day in the woods. During the event people also found out about the ancient craft of coppicing and its importance in conserving the wildlife of Furzefield Wood.

## Hertsmere allotments

CMS volunteers have been working hard on two allotment sites in Bushey over the winter, contributing over 110 hours of volunteer time.

At Finch Lane allotments the boundary hedge has been improved by planting native trees and a small area of Hazel coppice to create new habitats for wildlife and, in time, provide a source of pea sticks and bean poles for allotment holders.

Work to improve Windmill Hill allotments for wildlife and plot holders, has seen volunteers plant a small orchard with Hertfordshire varieties of apple and plum; and install new entrance signs and allotment notice boards.

Funding for the work came from Watling Chase Community Forest (WCCF) and Hertsmere Borough Council, but would not have been possible without the support of the CMS Wednesday volunteer team.



This traditional approach to woodland management also allows the work to be done in a sensitive manner with minimal damage to the ground compared to modern mechanised forestry equipment.

Visit Furzefield Wood in the spring to see the beautiful carpets of Bluebells that thrive here thanks to the continuity of coppice management.
