A vision that recognises our opportunities as well as our challenges

What drives us today

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Hertsmere is a largely **rural** Borough in Hertfordshire, situated immediately to the north of London. With 80% of our borough in **Green Belt** land, the majority of our 105,000 residents live in our **four main towns** - Bushey, Borehamwood, Radlett and Potters Bar - each with their own identity. Excellent **north-south rail and road connections** mean that Hertsmere is very well connected to London and the rest of the country.

It's this mix of green areas, distinct towns, and strong connections that means life in Hertsmere offers a great **balance of city and countryside**.

It is also this location and strong connections which make Hertsmere a great place to establish a business, and the borough has attracted a number of **major employers** as a result. The professional, scientific or technical; construction, and ICT industries are particularly strong. An active film and television industry exists around Borehamwood, which has

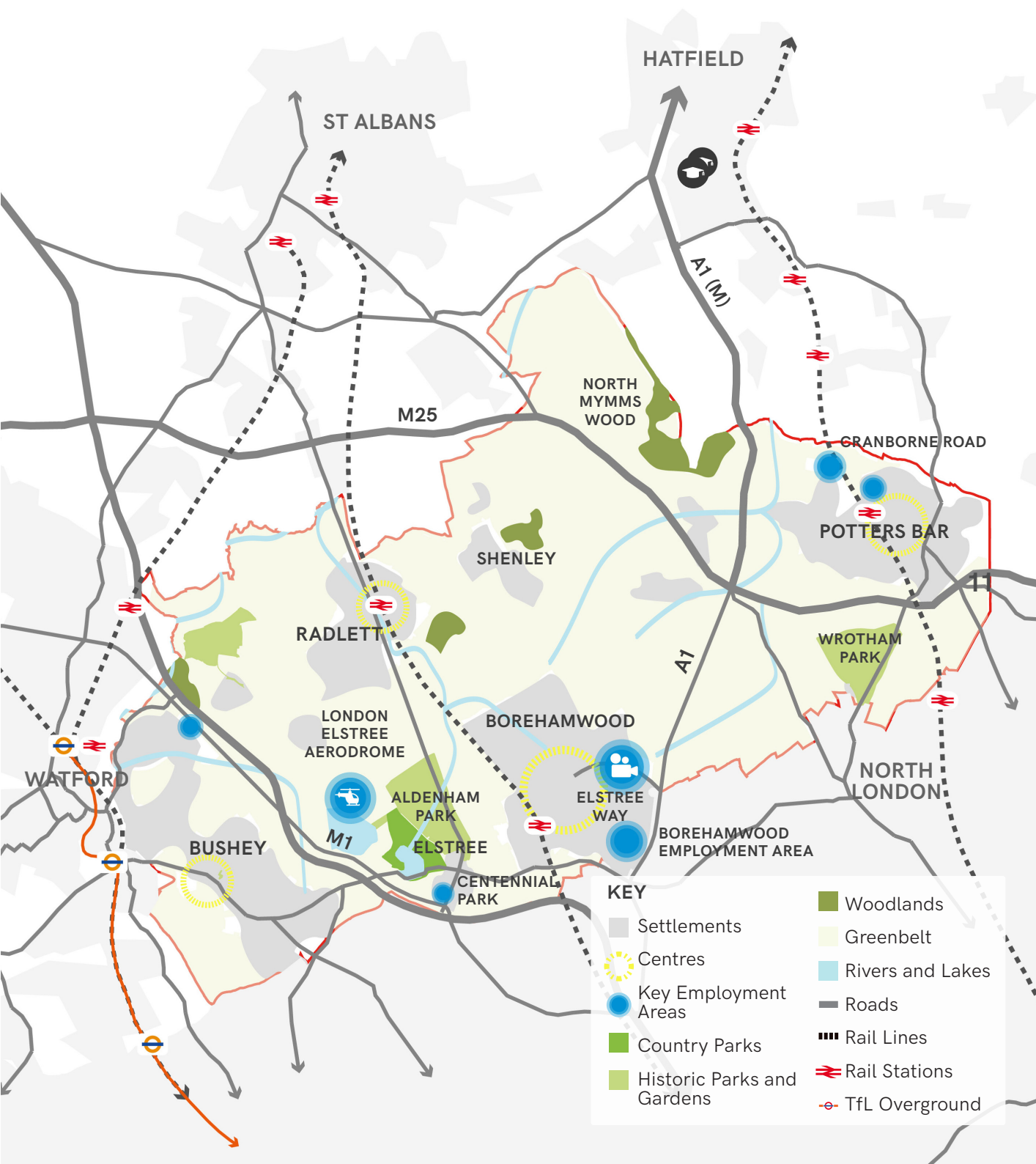
a heritage of film and television production dating back to the early 20th century. A budding avionics specialism is currently developing at London Elstree Aerodrome.

Small businesses also make up an important part of the local economy.

However, **proximity to the capital also brings challenges** including recruitment and retention of workers and talent, high house prices which particularly impact first time buyers, along with high and rising private rental costs.

Hertsmere's population today is **growing, aging and diversifying**, with a notable Jewish population and growing South Asian community. While relatively prosperous, pockets of real deprivation exist within the borough with part of Cowley Hill ward in Borehamwood being the most deprived in Hertfordshire and in the top 10% of deprived areas nationally (IMD 2019).

Overall population health is good, although health inequalities do exist.

What might drive us tomorrow?

Climate Emergency

The UK Parliament has declared a climate emergency, with Hertsmere Borough Council following suit. In 2019 the UK Government committed to reducing greenhouse gas emissions to net zero by 2050.

Rising global temperatures and the increase in unpredictable weather events such as flash flooding raise fundamental questions about the role and function of the natural and built environment in reducing carbon emissions and allowing us to live sustainable lifestyles.

In the face of climate breakdown, we need to radically change the ways we conduct our lives, societies, and economies; to do so will be both to safeguard the planet and to increase our own resilience.

A Changing Population

The UK's population is growing, and its demographics and living trends are changing. The country is ageing, though the number of families with children continues to rise in line with population growth. Families are getting smaller. More young adults are living with their parents, and more people are living alone. Home ownership is falling.

Overall, we're living longer and healthier, though health inequalities persist. The built and natural environment in which we live can have a major impact on both our physical and mental health. Access to public transport, distance to local services and a lack of accessible open space can act as barriers to more active lifestyles. Creating well-connected neighbourhoods is one of the greatest opportunities in improving accessibility and enabling healthy lifestyles.

Covid-19 Pandemic

The past year has provided us with no choice but to evaluate the places and spaces in which we live, work, shop, exercise and raise our children. Lines between home, office, crèche, cafe, and gym have blurred; high streets, local centres and parks have become focal points for daily life; and the pandemic has demonstrated the value of access to open spaces and social infrastructure within walking distance.

We have learned that we still yearn to come together as a social people, but that this can take on many shapes and forms. Many have suffered greatly, and recovery may take years.

Technology & Digitisation

Digital systems are increasingly a part of our built environment, economies, social lives and institutions. Changes can be small, like bike sharing, or big, like artificial intelligence. They can be led by authorities, like electric car charging points or contact free car parking payments, or by companies, like ride sharing apps or automated delivery services. They can also be citizen-powered, like open data platforms or online crowdfunding. No matter how small or big, digital innovations are ever-more present in all aspects of society.

From changing how we work and in what industries, to how we shop, connect with friends, consume media or travel, this shift towards digital living poses many challenges for economies, places and governance. But it also has the potential to make our places more efficient, resilient, inclusive, and liveable.

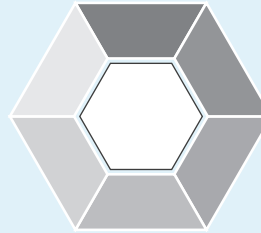


One approach

Our approach is a single message that defines how we work in Hertsmere. Across all our departments, services, projects, and partnerships, this is our commitment to embracing the future.

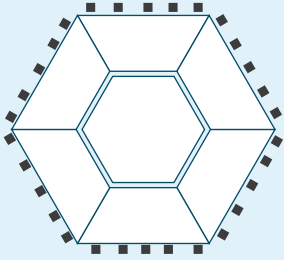

These statements describe what we stand for in Hertsmere. They are focussed on our values, and strong commitments for embracing the future.

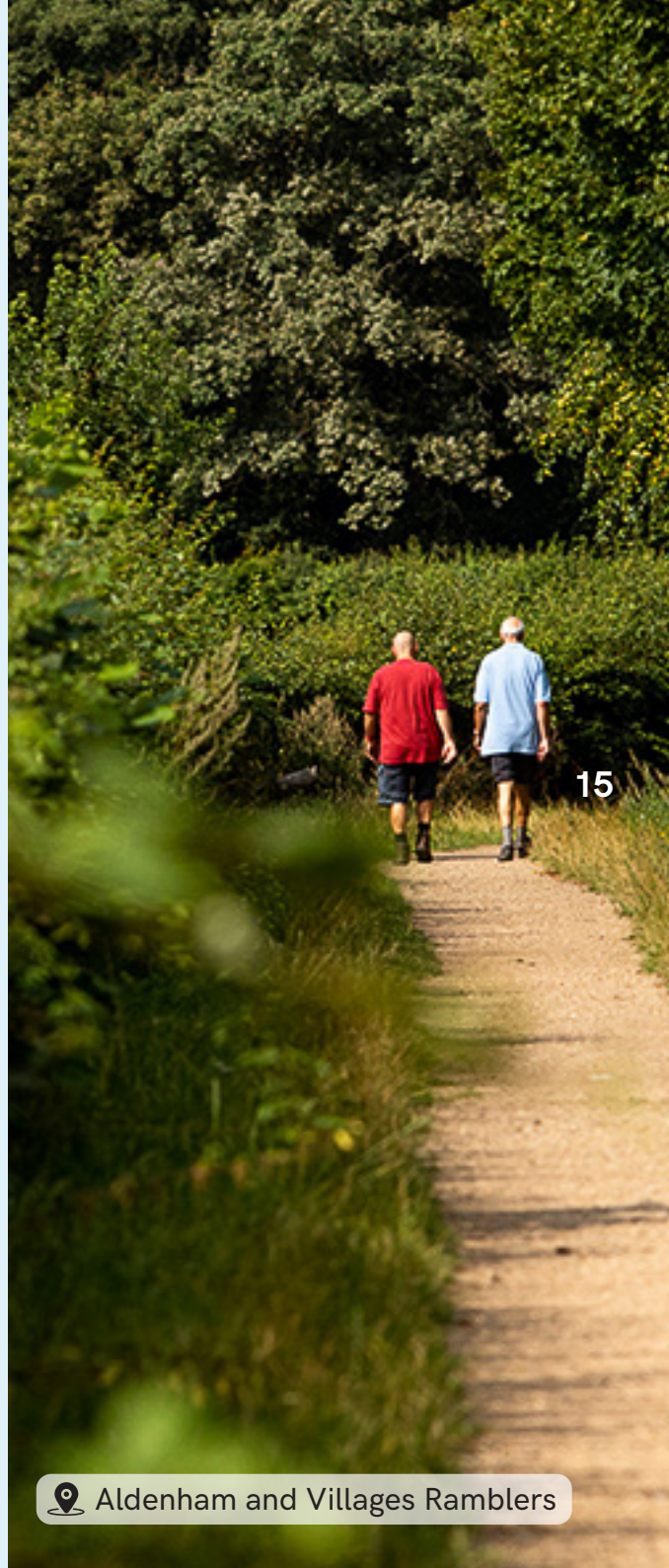


30 commitments
